## A WORLDWIDE MOVEMENT

Over 100 years ago, in 1919, Rudolf Steiner founded the first Waldorf School in Stuttgart, Germany upon request of entrepreneur Emil Molt, who had asked him to create a school for the children of workers at the Waldorf-Astoria cigarette factory. Today there are over 1.250 Waldorf schools and 1.900 Waldorf kindergartens in over 75 countries around the globe – and the movement is growing fast. Most of these schools are located in Europe and represented by our members.

# STEINER WALDORF

Steiner Waldorf schools offer a human-centred education emphasising the role of the imagination and the self-activity of the learner. They promote the balanced development of student capacities through artistic, academic, physical, and social learning. The Steiner Waldorf curriculum is non-prescriptive and matches the learning of skills and knowledge to the developmental tasks of the students. It avoids an undue early specialisation or inappropriate academic pressure. The core curriculum is taught in block lessons. A class teacher accompanies children from school entry age for a number of years in succession. Our schools are co-educational, non-selective, comprehensive and integrated from ISCED 1-3. Our model of governance is one in which leadership and management serve the quality of the education, enabling the development of own potential and capacity building in students, teachers and co-workers. The pedagogy is developed and evaluated collegially.



## OUR ACTIVITIES

#### EEA Working Group Schools 2021-2025:

This working group is facilitated by the European Commission and brings together experts from national education ministries, relevant EU bodies, international organisations, social partners and civil society to further policy development through mutual learning and the identification of good practices. ECSWE is a member for the entire 4-year mandate of the group, and represented by Dr Martyn Rawson.

## HERMMES partnership for age-appropriate media education:

Together with 15 partners, ECSWE is dedicated to developing internationally relevant open source material for schools, teachers and parents on holistic media education. This project is co-financed by the ERASMUS+ programme of the European Union for the period of 3 years, from 2022 to 2025.

#### Networking and capacity building for members:

Based on regular structured calls with our members, we map their needs and provide support in the form of capacity building sessions, networking opportunities and the setup of thematic working groups. Upon request, we also stand ready to provide tailored support to our members in their national level advocacy.





## ADVOCACY PRIORITIES

To implement our mission, we promote freedom in education and school autonomy. The provision of genuine Steiner Waldorf education tailored to local needs is best achieved if the following conditions are met:

- Freedom of curriculum: National associations and local schools can define and fully implement their own school curricula;
- The freedom of parental school choice as described in Article 14, Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union is granted Europe wide;
- Full public funding for independent non-profit schools implemented Europe wide to realize the right of parental school choice, irrespective of financial means;
- Diversity in assessment is a reality: Our schools may develop and provide their own, state-recognised diploma. Standardised and centralised tests are replaced with formative and ipsative assessment;
- Age-appropriate media education and computer studies is respected and our schools may deliver it based on our development-oriented approach.



## OUR ORGANIZATION

The European Council for Steiner Waldorf Education (ECSWE) consists of 27 national Steiner Waldorf schools associations representing over 800 schools and 190.000 pupils in 29 European countries. The organisation is funded by contributions of our members that are calculated based on pupils numbers in the member countries.

**Role:** The Board formally administers and represents the association. It develops the long-term strategy of the organisation and steers Council activities, sets the agenda of Council meetings and hires and supervises the Managing Director. Board members are elected by the Council for a period of 3 years.
